Guest Speaker Kevin Douglass Greene Great-Great Grandson of Frederick & Anna Murry Douglass



Mr. Kevin Greene has dedicated his life to serving his country and his community. Kevin was born in Paris, France, and celebrates the same birth month as his great-great grandfather. A native of Seaside, California, Kevin retired from the U.S. Army in 2003 and currently resides in Cumberland City, Tennessee. During his 20 years of active duty in the Army, he served as a role model for soldiers and civilians alike. Throughout his military

career, Kevin devoted his spare time to promoting self-worth, pride, and education in young people through various programs and sharing the legacy of Frederick Douglass, a former enslaved human, husband, father, abolitionist, and statesman.

In 2006, Kevin graduated from Middle Tennessee State University. He has received several awards including the Army's Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, Saint Barbara Field Artillery Medal, The National Federation of Black Veterans Network, and honorary membership with the rank of brigadier general. Kevin has presented to multiple organizations and educational institutions throughout the United States and many countries around the world. He is currently a human resource specialist, with 16 years in the Department of Veterans Affairs and over 35 years of Federal service. Kevin has grown in his knowledge and convictions igniting a new passion for a very old problem of this world: to end enslavement, human trafficking, and racism. Kevin has teamed up with very likely allies, his family; he is a senior advisor with the Frederick Douglass Family Initiative and a supporter and speaker with Hands Across Philadelphia organizations. Together this coalition actively promotes the Million Abolitionists Project, to distribute Frederick Douglass books to young people around the world.

Brief History of Douglass High School

Douglass High School was built during segregation and was Loudoun County's first and only Black high school from 1941 to 1968, when segregated education ended in the County.

For years, delegations of parents and patrons met with the Loudoun County School Board to request adequate facilities and additional teachers for their children. They were repeatedly told there were no funds to purchase land, while funds were found to purchase additional land for white schools. Undeterred, the parents worked together and, with the help of Jeanes Supervisor, Gertrude Alexander (Supervisor of Black Teachers), formed the County-Wide League in 1938 to consolidate and strengthen their efforts. The community raised \$4,000 through donations, bake sales, and the assistance of William "Willie" Hall who obtained a loan so that a school site could be secured. With that money in hand,



the League was able to negotiate and purchase the land the school now sits on from William S. Gibbons, to build an accredited high school. The League hired well-known civil rights attorney Charles Hamilton Houston to help persuade County officials to allocate funds for the new school. The School Board agreed to fund the high school if the League sold the land to the School Board for \$1.

Douglass High School was opened for the 1941-1942 school year. An addition was built in 1954, and another addition (including the gymnasium) in 1960, to comprise the building as you see it today. Douglass High School closed its doors in 1968, with full integration but wonderful memories remain.

The County-Wide League

The Loudoun County-Wide League was formed in November 1938, with the help of Gertrude A. Alexander, the Jeanes Supervisor for the Black schools. The League, comprised of members of the various Parent-Teacher Associations (PTAs) for Black schools, banded together to have a collective voice seeking better educational facilities, teacher tools, and teacher salaries. It is unclear when the League disbanded; it is mentioned in School Board minutes through 1959. Below is a list of the Officers appointed at the first meeting in 1938, and those who signed the Deed transferring the land to the School Board in December 1940:

 - March The Loudoun Branch of NAACP is formed

- 1941 February Taylor Manufacturing Company awarded the contract to build Douglass High School
 - September 3 First day of school for students attending Douglass High School
- 1942 January Douglass High School receives accreditation for the 1941-1942 school year
- 1954 Douglass High School is expanded with additional classrooms
- 1960 Douglass High School is expanded to add a gymnasium and classrooms



Douglass High School Consortium Information

In October 2022, the Loudoun County School Board endorsed individual Memorandum of Understanding with three Loudoun County Public Schools-related historical organizations which include dedicated space in the newly renovated 1941 section of Douglass High School. The three organizations are:



Loudoun Douglass High School Alumni Association (LDAA), comprised of the students and descendants of students who attended Douglass High School from 1941 through 1968, has firsthand knowledge of and experience with the fight for equal education for Blacks in Loudoun County;

The Loudoun County Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); and





The Edwin Washington Society (EWS) is comprised of volunteers working to preserve the history of Black education throughout segregation

These organizations agree to collaborate and partner together in telling of life stories in segregated Loudoun County, Virginia. Although the three entities have much in

common, there is much diversity. Each organization brings a wealth of history and knowledge that compliments the others to ensure histories are documented.





Loudoun Douglass High School Alumni Association (LDAA)

In 1984, a small group of former students who attended the Loudoun Training School (20 Union Street, Leesburg) and/or Douglass High School (DHS) got together for dinner. While socializing, members from the Class of 1953 came together with an idea to start an alumni association aimed at providing scholarships to students and financial assistance to charitable organizations in Loudoun County. As a result of the 1984 discussion, the Loudoun Douglass High School Alumni Association (LDAA) was established in 1985 and became a

501(c)(3) non-profit organization. As a fledgling organization, LDAA was only known to those who attended DHS. In establishing a newly formed organization, it seemed natural to have only those who attended or graduated from either school be members of the association or serve as members of the Board of Directors.

However, we use the term "alumni" very loosely. We are a diverse and inclusive organization, and we include anyone who has a connection to either school. All students, graduates, community members, and descendants are encouraged and welcome to join LDAA.

LDAA focuses its efforts on enhancing the lives of young adults by providing opportunities to further their education. Specifically, our mission is to foster an engaged and passionate community by sharing the rich history of DHS. In addition to preserving the legacy of DHS, we provide financial support – via scholarships.

LDAA, as part of a multi-organization consortium, is the lead curator for The Historic Douglass High School Education and Development Campus. Through



this role, we will ensure the history of DHS and our stories are told accurately. LDAA looks forward to providing leadership as the primary curator at The Historic Douglass High School, a cultural destination where we will document and showcase the relevance of Douglass High School in the history of Loudoun County.

Edwin Washington Society

The Edwin Washington Society is named after the first Black teenager in Loudoun County whom we documented as having sought an education while keeping his job, though we know there must have been many more. Our biggest efforts are (1) the Edwin Washington Project documenting segregated education and its impact, (2) the opening of a research center in the Douglass High School building, (3) the Bulletin of Loudoun County History, which since the 1950s has covered all aspects of local history, (4) a digital map of all Loudoun schools built before 1968, soon to be expanded to cover other areas as well, and (5) a database to allow easy searching for relevant historical data. Other projects are planned.

We work closely with Loudoun County Public Schools to preserve and protect a collection of historical documents. We also conduct research in archives across the nation to better understand our subject matter and are a member of the Country-School Association of America (CSAA). To preserve the legacy of Douglass High School, built in 1941 as the only dedicated high school building for Blacks in the County, we helped form the Consortium, along with the Loudoun Douglass High School Alumni Association and the Loudoun Branch of the NAACP. Nonaffiliated private citizens can also participate with us.



The Loudoun Branch of the NAACP

The Loudoun County Branch of the NAACP was chartered on March 24, 1940, around the issue of equal education. At the urging of Attorney Charles Hamilton Houston (Dean of Howard University School of Law, Legal Counsel to the NAACP, and later, mentor to Mr. Thurgood Marshall), a local beautician (Marie Medley) sent away for its charter and became the first president of the Loudoun County Chapter of the NAACP. Members and leaders worked together with the previously established County-Wide League to convince the School Board to build a high school, provide bus transportation, and obtain equal pay for the Black teachers of the County.


We are committed to dismantling racism and disrupting inequality to create a society where all people can truly be free. Our work includes civic engagement, systemically building racial equity, and supporting policies and institutions that prioritize the urgent needs of Black people, who are most impacted by race-based discrimination. NAACP Loudoun Branch is a volunteer-based non-profit. We provide scholarships to high school graduates of color, support and promote local programs to preserve and expand Black-owned small businesses and work to ensure equality of rights for all persons.





Frederick Douglass on Bench

By Jon Hair, Sculptor

Jon Hair has fulfilled over 125 Public Art Commissions in his 22 years as a sculptor. His clients include the U.S. Olympic Committee, the U.S. Air Force Academy, the Computer Sciences Corporation, the Cities of Beijing and Shanghai, The Emmys Hall of Fame, 46 colleges and universities, and many more. He has been an art director, designer, musician (he says jamming with Jimi Hendrix



was a high point), and an advertising entrepreneur. In 2000, Mr. Hair added sculptor to his list of skills and has created more than 100 public monuments for universities, cities, and corporations.

Mr. Hair was engaged to create a sculpture of Frederick Douglass located in the east courtyard of The Historic Douglass High School Education & Development Campus.

"Game Time" Sports Mural

By Jason Tetlak, Artist



Jason Tetlak of Jacksonville, Florida, was selected by the Douglass High School Commemorative Committee to install this mural on the outside wall of the 1960 gymnasium. The mural focuses on the idea of people coming together to enjoy themselves in a friendly competition. Figures and icons representing various sports that were played at Douglass between 1941 and 1968 are depicted in the mural. The mural breaks the surface into smaller shapes that are filled with eye-catching colors.

Mr. Tetlak is a world record-setting mural artist who has worked on over 40 public art projects in ten states. He was also a featured artist for the Basel House Mural Festival in Miami, Florida, and started a local public art initiative in Jacksonville, Florida, that has helped revitalize the Murray Hill neighborhood by installing more than 15 murals. Mr. Tetlak was chosen by the Arts & Humanities Council of Tuscaloosa, Florida, to be the first artist to paint a mural as part of their mural project and was recently the first artist to ever paint a mural for the Corpus Christi Mural Festival as well. Mr. Tetlak has had murals voted "Best Public Artwork" in Jacksonville, Florida, on three occasions, and set a Guinness World Record for the largest 3D painting. Additionally, Mr. Tetlak has worked with comedian Josh Blue who won Last Comic Standing on NBC, he was featured on ESPN for his redreveal mural with NFL quarterback Baker Mayfield.



Upward StruggleBy Jeffery L. Hall, Sculptor

This sculpture, which will be placed in the front plaza, represents the historic struggle for equal education and the resilience of the Black community.





Local artist Jeffery L. Hall is a world-renowned sculptor. His ceramic and bronze creations have been shown internationally and his architectural sculptures adorn government buildings, churches and estates including commissions for the U.S. Capitol building, the Park Potomac building, the Turkish Embassy residence, and the Washington National Cathedral.

Shop/Band Building Mural



This photo was painted as a mural inside the shop/band building now named the "Daniel, Hankerson, Knox" building. The brick building is located on the western side of the campus, west of the high school. The photo was found through the research efforts of the Edwin Washington Society, in the Virginia State University Archives, several years ago and was labeled as coming from Loudoun County.

The mural was created by Robert Mayhew, artist, with SUI (Signs Unlimited, Inc.).






The time capsule is to be opened in 2072.



Updated State Historic Marker





Loudoun County Parks, Recreation & Community Service Playground




County of Loudoun Parks, Recreation & Community Services, in conjunction with Loudoun County Public Schools' vision to restore and preserve the history and cultural significance of Douglass High School, is telling a story in the onsite playground. This playground replacement is a themed experience that embraces the global impact and contributions African Americans have made as a part of American history. Custom structures have been designed to embody an authentic play experience through intentional educational components. The "Hall of Heroes" is inspired by the architecture of the National Museum of African American History and Culture, and is in the center structure that sets the tone for the themed



playground concept. The play structure is designed to be visually appealing, ADA-accessible, multigenerational, educational, and a fun experience. The exterior captures the struggle and hope of African American people through etched images, which can be similarly explored. Additional themes include civil and social progress, innovation and technology, and arts and entertainment.




