A MEMO FROM MUSIC:

During the month of March, the students will continue to learn about Jazz music and our Composer/Musician of the Quarter Duke Ellington. Encourage them to share their favorite piece with you!

Spring chorus rehearsals have begun! Our Spring concert will be held on June 7th @6:30pm, here at Moorefield Station. Fourth grade will continue to rehearse on Thursday afternoons from 1:45pm-2:15pm and the fifth grade will rehearse on Monday mornings from 8:00am-8:25am. First grade continues to work on reading rhythms using quarter and eight note patterns. Second grade is learning the half note, as well as the unpitched percussion instruments. Third grade has been introduced to sixteenth notes, and we are also singing in cannon and round. Fourth grade continues to sharpen their recorder skills, as well as, learn how to play a major scale, and improvisation. Fifth grade is also busy working on Recorder Karate and earning their "belts."

We thoroughly enjoyed dancing with all of our students and their families at Cultural Heritage Night. What fun it was to see families and friends enjoying themselves together!

SNIPPETS FROM SEARCH:



During the month of March, students will continue to enjoy a variety of challenging lessons.

Students in kindergarten will use their Creating Thinking Key to "write a picture". Kindergarteners will practice spatial reasoning as they work on a unique matching activity.

First graders will be partnering up for both our lessons this month. First, students will work cooperatively to figure out interesting, often funny, alphabet drawings in our "An Alphabet You Never Met" lesson. Students will then rely on reasoning, mathematical skills, and perseverance to problem-solve using dominoes.

In second grade, students will work in teams as they use clues and their reasoning thinking to solve for the "Secret Number". Second graders will continue to rely on their logical and mathematical reasoning as they try a new lesson called "Balance Beans".

Students in third and fourth grades will also be introduced to a new lesson – "Keva Planks". For this challenge, students will rely on their spatial reasoning to build structures using information from a clue card. Students will then use their

Evaluating Thinking Key as they answer the question "Would You Rather . . . ?"

ART E-FACTS:

Students in grades first through fifth have been busy learning about art and traditions from other cultures. Each grade level worked hard to create beautiful multi-cultural pieces in conjunction with preparation for Heritage Night. The full-day kindergarten classes recently finished crayon resist patterns based on the weavings of the Inca Empire. The first grade classes have finished an Aboriginal artwork. The students learned about the significance and process of creating the handprint dot paintings before starting the project. Second grade made themselves dressed in a kimono. The students learned facts about the history of the kimono before creating the tie-dyed coffee filters used to create them. The third grade classes created amazing threedimensional Greek theatre masks. The students learned many paper manipulation techniques to form their masks and add emotion to them as well. The fourth graders created Native American spirit animal paintings. Following the history of totems, they reviewed the color wheel to create a plan for their paintings. Finally, the fifth graders as worked on metal while creating beautiful African animal reliefs. The students first drew their animal, then transferred them to the metal. They used techniques such as repousse and embossing to give dimension to their compositions.

BITS AND BYTES FROM THE LAB:

This month students in grade 2 completed the CogAT test. The Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) is a multiple-choice test designed to measure a child's academic aptitude. We also had our 2nd school-wide Epic Build. We were excited by the number of parents and visitors who came out to see



all the hard work the students did to prepare for this day. Students displayed their robots and shared the programs they wrote to bring them to life. In addition to our Epic Build, we had Cultural Heritage Night. The computer lab was transformed into Antarctica. Families participated in hands on activities about penguins. They read a story called "There was a Cold Lady who Swallowed some Snow" and used ozobots to code a story. Other activities included, QR codes to learn about penguin facts, solving puzzles using "Breakout.edu" and watching penguins on a live webcam. Everyone had a great time participating in fun activities as they learned a little more about Antarctica.

Next month we look forward to our third coding cycle which involves Minecraft. We will also revisit Internet safety and digital citizenship lessons. Each class will have a chance to browse the fair for a short time. Students can make a wish list to share with their parents. This helps parents know the books (and their cost) that their children are interested in adding to their home library. All classes will also have a 20 minute block of time during the school day for those students who would like to purchase books from the fair. Please be sure to discuss types of books and appropriate content with your child before shopping the fair. All sales are final. There are no returns or exchanges, so we encourage students to make appropriate choices when shopping and making their purchase. If students bring in money to shop during the school day on a day that is not their assigned time, it is up to the classroom teacher to let them do so. Students should not be missing instructional time to shop at the book fair. We encourage students to purchase books - not so much of the "frilly frolly" stuff (i.e. pointers, frilly pens/pencils, etc.). However, if you send in money with your child and will allow them to spend money on non-book items, please send a note in as well so we know what is allowed. We also ask that you send a note stating how much your child is able to spend at the book fair. This is especially helpful for those that send in checks. If you send a check in with your child, please do not make it out for a set amount as we cannot give change from checks. Let us know their spending limit and we will fill in the exact amount for you and send home a receipt. Checks should be made payable to Moorefield Station Elementary.

Parents and community members are welcome to shop during the school day as well!

*Please note although our book fair is through Scholastic, it is not associated with Scholastic Book Clubs. They are two separate fundraising / reading promotion programs. Scholastic Book Clubs is done through your child's classroom teacher, not the school library, and supports their classroom library. Scholastic Book Fairs is a fundraiser that supports our school library and school reading programs.

BOOK SWAP

We need donations of gently used (or new) books for all grade levels (PreK - 5) for our Book Swap at the end of the year. We will continue to collect books throughout the year to be ready! The goal is for every student to choose a book

SAFETY FIRST:

To Request Entry:

All exterior doors will be closed and locked at the beginning of school and remain so until students are released for the day. Using the AIPHONE will be the only way visitors will be admitted to the school.

VOLUNTEER NOTICE:



Don't forget that Loudoun County has a policy that all volunteers must submit a "volunteer form" to the elementary. If you are planning on volunteering at Moorefield Station, please submit this form to our office staff. A copy of the form can be found on our school's website on the right-side bar.

HEALTH ROOM NEWS:



This year at MSE, there are children who have weakened immune systems. In an effort to provide a healthy environment for these students (and all students) we will need your help. Students who have fevers should be kept home until fever free for 24 hours without the use of medication. Students who do not feel well should stay home.

If your child is ill because of a contagious disease such as flu, strep, chicken pox, measles, etc. Note the reason for the absence when you call the absentee call-line or absentee email. This will allow the students' parents to take measures to protect their child and follow up with their child's physician.

Return to School after Surgery or Emergency Room Visit

Students who have had surgery or who have been treated in the emergency room are expected to bring a physician's clearance for school attendance. This clearance should include when the student is released to return to school, what restrictions the student may have, and the duration of any restrictions. - Students Rights and Responsibilities Handbook

Medications at School

Please remember that a parent or guardian must bring medication to the nurse, health office specialist, or designee. Students are not permitted to transport any medicine (prescription or non-prescription) to or from school. Medication must be brought to school in the original container with appropriate label intact. Medication will be kept in a locked medicine area of the clinic.

Whenever there is a change in your child's medication or dosage amount, you must submit a new Loudoun County Medication Form. You may obtain this form from the school Health Office or on the Loudoun County Public School website.

Change of Clothes

Spills, bathroom accidents and mud happen to students of all ages, from PK to 5th grade. Please put a change of clothes in your child's backpack- just in case it is needed!

The school has a very limited supply of "oops" clothing. If your child comes home wearing clothes from the health office, please launder it and return it the next day.

'Tis the Cold and Flu Season! Good hand washing, using plenty of soap and water for 20 seconds, is key to preventing illness. Consider keeping your child home if he/she has:

- A fever of 100.4 degrees or higher
- Has been vomiting
- Has symptoms that prevent him/her from participating in school, such as:
 - o Excessive tiredness or lack of appetite
 - Productive cough or sneezing
 - o Sore throat
 - o Headache, earache, body aches

A minor sore throat is not a problem, but a severe sore throat could be strep even if there is no fever. Other symptoms of strep in children are headache and stomach upset. Contact your pediatrician as your child needs a special test.

The flu is serious! Call your pediatrician at the first sign of flu symptoms, which come on suddenly, including:

- High fever
- Chills
- Headache, body aches, ear ache
- Nausea, vomiting

Chapped lips are common in cold, windy weather. Please have your child apply lip balm on chapped lips before leaving for school in the morning. He/she may bring lip balm to school to reapply during the day.



Baby, it's cold outside Students should wear warm coats to school, hats and/or gloves to wear during outdoor recess.

Scoliosis Curvature of the Spine

Scoliosis is an abnormal curving of the spine from side to side often described as an "S" curve. It affects 2% of Americans, mostly adolescents.

Cause

- The cause is unknown in most cases.
- Girls are affected more often than boys.
- Untreated, severe scoliosis can lead to lung and heart damage, back problems, and distressing cosmetic changes.

Normal Spine

Has a slight outward curve in the upper back and an inward curve at the waist.

If scoliosis is detected early, then treatment can be started before it becomes a physical or emotional disability.

Signs

- One shoulder higher than the other
- Scapula (shoulder blade) on one side of the body is higher or more prominent
- One-sided fullness at the waist
- One hip higher than the other
- Unequal rib prominence

Normal View from Back

Shoulder blades and spine appear straight



Abnormal View from Back

The spine curves abnormally to the side



Abnormal View Bending Forward




Shoulders and/or hips appear uneven

Symptoms

- Backache or low back pain
- Fatigue
- Maybe none

How to Check Your Child's Spine

- Stand behind the child.
- Ask child to stand with feet together and bend forward to touch the toes.
- Check that the shoulders and the top of the hips are at the same height, the head is centered, and the rib cage is symmetrical. Note that the waist is even and that the body does not lean to one side.
- It may be helpful to run your hands along the spine to detect any abnormalities.
- Ask the child to stand up, turn around to face you, and to bend down again.
- Repeat the assessment.



 If any lateral curvature is noted, your child needs further evaluation.

What should be done if any of the signs and symptoms are present?

Contact your primary care physician for an appointment to have your child's back evaluated.



DAY CARE RIDERS:

If you are a parent with children attending daycare facilities at the end of each day, it is important that you communicate with them if your child is absent on a particular day or that you have picked your child up early from school.

SPEED LIMIT ON SCHOOL GROUNDS:

We are concerned for the safety of your child at school. If you are on our grounds, please pay attention to your speed while driving on our campus. We have noticed adults going over the state required speed of 25 MPH. Please help us keep your children safe!


