Answers to frequently asked questions:

What assessments or evaluations need to be done before K?

Teams are not required to request re-evaluation upon exiting preschool unless:

- A change in disability is suspected, or
- To consider dismissal for special education.



What will be different in the IEP?

- The IEP meeting held to transition the student from preschool to a kindergarten level
 of services is to be held at the student's school of attendance if they are currently
 attending a class-based program or the home school if they are receiving ECSE
 resource services. The home school is based on the location of the student's
 residence.
- The present level of academic and functional performance and goals will be drafted by the ECSE teacher in collaboration with and input from a Kindergarten level of special education staff.
- The transition meeting will include the administrator from the school of attendance, kindergarten teacher, special education teacher, related service staff (if appropriate), a representative from the home school, as well as the ECSE teacher and the parents.




What is preschool exception?

- The Parent makes a decision to delay the start of kindergarten for one year.
 - The school division is required to draft an IEP for any student age eligible for
 Kindergarten and the IEP team then discusses this draft at the IEP meeting.
 If/when the parent decides to delay the start of Kindergarten and have their child
 remain in preschool for an additional year the team is then required to discuss
 what services would look like for that additional year in preschool.
- A preschool exception is allowable for one school year.



Great things in preschool:

- Teacher engagement/relationship with child
- Kindness of teachers
- Lots of communication
- Instruction/program/curriculum
- My child loves school!
- Improved communication
- Small class size/ratio
- Individualized attention





How do I register for kindergarten?

- All students are required to register for Kindergarten at their home school.
- Registration requires a completed and signed registration form, proof of residency, birth certificate, a parent or guardian photo I.D. and legal/custody papers (if applicable).
- A current physical/immunization form must be provided to complete the registration process prior to the first day of school.
- Registration is tentatively in March. Look for this information on the county's website, <u>www.lcps.org</u>.
- If the team has determined prior to kindergarten registration, that the student will be a preschool exception, the student does not need to be registered for Kindergarten.



 structured breaks





