

People who made significant contributions during the Revolutionary War era:



GEORGE WASHINGTON

Provided **military leadership** by serving as **commander-in-chief of the Continental Army**



THOMAS JEFFERSON

Provided **political leadership** by expressing the reasons for colonial independence from Great Britain in the **Declaration of Independence**



PATRICK HENRY

Inspired patriots from other colonies when he spoke out against taxation without representation by saying "give me liberty or give me death"



MARQUIS de LAFAYETTE

Was a French nobleman who volunteered his service to the Continental Army during the American Revolution. The king of France provided French troops, ships, and money. The Marquis de Lafayette contributed to the victory at Yorktown.



JAMES LAFAYETTE

Was an enslaved African American from Virginia who **served as a spy in the Continental Army** during the Revolutionary War. He successfully requested his freedom after the war with the support of the Marquis de Lafayette.

The last major battle of the Revolutionary War was fought at Yorktown, Virginia.



While this victory did not end the war, it was the last significant military battle involving British forces and the Continental Army.

The American victory at Yorktown resulted in	the surrender of the British army in 1781, which led to	the end of the war and the signing of the Treaty of Paris in 1783.
